Kōtui go live in Marlborough

On 29 September Kōtui, a shared library system, went live at Marlborough District Libraries.

Kōtui

Marlborough is the first of 15 library networks set to implement Kōtui over the next 2 years, with Taupo coming on line as this newsletter goes to print.

The word "kōtui" in Māori means to interlace or interweave. Kōtui comprises four components: a system to manage a library's physical items (provided by SirsiDynix), a search facility across a library's physical and electronic items (provided by EBSCO Publishing's EBSCO Electronic Discovery Service), and a centralised data hosting service (provided by Computer Concepts Ltd) The National Library provides the fourth component, the New Zealand based support and administrative function for the Kōtui service and this will be delivered via APNK.

The concept and delivery of the Kōtui shared service is the result of collaboration between a group of public libraries, the Association of Public Library Managers (APLM), Local Government New Zealand (LGNZ) and the National Library.

Student undertaking Kete research

Kete admins should be aware that the following piece of research is being undertaken by VUW student, Linda Rosvall. A survey will be distributed to those involved with Kete in mid-October.

Research Title:

An exploratory investigation into the socio-cultural and archival value of Kete, a professionally mediated, collaborative, participatory and localised, approach to publishing personal and community archives online.

Research objectives:

The objective of this research is to discover and interpret how the everyday sense making of Kete Support Personnel shapes the Kete experience, focusing on the collaborative-ness of Kete, the digital affordances and cultures in Kete, and the future potential and commitment to Kete.

Research Method:

Online survey questionnaire. Survey link to be emailed to Kete Administrators and other identifiable Kete Support Staff mid October 2011.

Researcher:

Research will be undertaken by Linda Rosvall in part fulfilment of a Master of Information Studies (MIS), at Victoria University of Wellington. linda.rosvall@gmail.com

Digital Audio recorders available

Tackling Tech-speak #2: "WAP"

"WAP" stands for "Wireless Access Point" and if your library has Wi-Fi then it also has a wap.

This rectangular device with an aerial sends out a signal that laptops, smart-phones and other mobile devices can detect and use to connect to the Internet. Often it will be placed high up as the best "reception" is when you have "line of sight" between the wap and the Wi-Fi enabled device.

The wap "broadcasts" an SSID (Service Set Identifier), which in APNK sites is the name of the library, that lets people know who owns the Wi-Fi they're about to connect to.
